# FINANCIAL SUMMARY FROM 2020

## Financial Summary From Fiscal Year: 6.1.19 - 5.31.20



## PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

During an unprecedented year with pandemic and wildfires, HCCSO was able to continue providing Healthy Start services, convening the Perinatal Task Forces, adding mental health counseling for mothers, and responding to emergency needs due to COVID. In 2020, HCCSO was able to:

- > Provide 16 hours of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion training to all staff
- > Serve 815 families through the Healthy Start program
- > Convene Perinatal Task Forces in Josephine and Douglas counties, comprised of 50+ community members, for collaboration in maternal health
- > Host virtual baby showers in Douglas and Josephine Counties
- > Assist 2,000+ families with emergency supplies in the wake of COVID (diapers, wipes, thermometers, educational materials)
- > Provide professional development trainings in Promoting First Relationships and a series on reproductive health in the LGBTQ+ population
- > Scholarship and support 25+ partners to complete the Certified Lactation Counselor training to increase breastfeeding support in Southern Oregon
- > Launch mental health counseling services for Healthy Start mothers
